4-H Demonstration

Virtual students who want to participate in the 4-H Demonstration Contest need to register at https://tiny.utk.edu/ACdemonstration and then upload a video of them giving their 4-H demonstration to their 4-H Google Classroom on or before April 1.

A demonstration is a talk that uses visual aids to help inform the audience. It could show the steps to make something such as "How to sew a tote bag." Or it can share information about a topic without actually showing how to make something. For example: "5 guidelines to prevent heart disease."

In your demonstration you can use visual aids (posters, models, PowerPoint, Google Slides, etc.) while you are talking. Topics MUST relate to one of the 4-H project categories:

Animal Science-Beef Computers and Technology Forestry, Wildlife & Fisheries Animal Science-Dairy Communications / Public Horticulture / Garden Leadership / Personal Dev. Animal Science-Goat Speaking Consumer Ed./ Economics Animal Science-Horse Line and Design Animal Science-Poultry Electric Nutrition. Health and Fitness Animal Science-Sheep Engineering / Safety Science Performing Arts / Recreation Animal Science-Swine Photography Entomology Citizenship Environmental Sc. / Plant Science Clothing/Textiles Conservation Veterinary Science Companion Animal **Food Science**

Just like a speech, a demonstration should have three parts--an introduction, the main body and a conclusion.

% No live animals!

- **Students** will have 3-5 minutes for their demonstration.
- Make sure any visual aid you bring to school complies with school rules.
- ※ You can use posters, props, and / or PowerPoint or Google Slides for your demonstration.
- # Use visual aids large enough for the audience to "see" the steps you discuss.
- If the visual aid you want to use is bulky, hard to transport, fragile, or expensive consider using a picture, drawing or diagram of the item instead of the actual item. For example, don't bring a glass aquarium if doing a demonstration about setting up a fish tank.
- **%** Must be an individual demonstration—**no teams**.
- **%** Youth will earn a blue ribbon (5 points), red ribbon (3 points) or white ribbon (1 point).
- * All club-level participants who earn a blue ribbon are invited to compete in county competition.
- category. 1st place winners advance to the Great Northwest competition in May.
