
Safe Planting Dates

Here are a few spring tasks to

Here are a few spring tasks to perform in your garden:

- Follow soil test advice for preplant fertilization
- Be sure to purchase disease resistant varieties and healthy stocky, dark green seedlings
- Fungicides are a preventative action used along with sanitation and crop rotation
- Control early weeds to combat insect and disease pressure
- Scout often for pests and diseases by checking leaf undersides and interior leaves



Record keeping is key to a successful cow/calf enterprise. Start by monthly recording all cow purchases, sales, deaths and movements among pastures. Prepare a budget to determine the cost of producing a calf as this will help towards marketing. And set goals whether its improving your handling facility or transitioning from a year-round to short-season calving. Below are a few spring tasks to consider:

- Prepare for start of hay harvest and water for grazing season
- Assess opportunity for weed control and warm-season grass
- Consult with your veterinarian on the vaccines and health products for your herd
